Our pupils are educated together, but each pupil is regarded as an individual with unique gifts and talents.

Progress is tracked monthly by Raising Standards' Teams at KS3, KS4 and Sixth Form to ensure all pupils are making progress.

We place <u>no limits</u> on what each child can achieve. Our mission is to ensure that every child makes exceptional progress in our school.



5 AXIOMS of a La Sallian School



St.Patrick's is a La Sallian school and seeks to make the vision of St. John the Baptist de la Salle a lived experience

These are the five truths on which a La Salle School is founded.

- Gospel values must permeate the life of a La Sallian school in such a way that pupils internalise those values.
- Human and Christian education: We aim for excellence in the spiritual, academic and vocational spheres, and seek to integrate them. Our curriculum is adapted to the needs of the pupils as individuals and as members of society.
- Teaching as a vocation: The work of teaching is a ministry in the life of the Church, modelled on the role of Jesus the teacher and Good Shepherd. All the staff at the school have a deep pastoral concern for the pupils as individuals.

- In and by association: Everyone involved in a La Sallian school has a part to play in forming a living educational community based on mutual respect and acceptance of one another.
- The La Sallian school is outward looking: We reach out to the world which surrounds us. In particular, we show a special concern for the poor: for young people who are disadvantaged, underprivileged, excluded or marginalised in any way.

GCSE

St Patrick's was the top performing non-selective school in Northern Ireland in 2015, with 82% of pupils achieving 5 GCSEs including maths and English.

Aspiration Ambition Achievement

We believe that every one of our pupils has God-given gifts and talents. Our job is to help them discover these so that they can fill their role in the world.

As St. Catherine of Siena said "Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire."

We believe in a holistic education and offer a wide variety of extra curricular opportunities to help each child develop talents and skills. In December 2015 four of our sixth form pupils were named Camogie All-Stars, Ciara Hill, Aimee Brennan, Hannah Hughes and Leah McGoldrick.

However we also recognise the critical importance of achieving good qualifications to broaden choice and increase the life chances of our young people.

Achievement: GCSE

St Patrick's was the top performing non-selective school in Northern Ireland in 2015; 82% of pupils achieved 5 GCSEs including maths and English. The equivalent figure for non-grammar schools was 47%

96% of our pupils achieved 5 or more GCSEs grades A*-C; the NI equivalent for non-grammar schools was 72%.

Achievement: A Level

At A Level in 2015, 68% of pupils gained 3 A' Levels at Grades A*-C in 2015 – 20% above NI average for non-selective schools

Leavers' Destinations

The majority of our pupils progress to Higher Education – three times the NI average

One third of our pupils progress to Training - twice the NI average

Teaching and Learning / Teamwork

Our teachers have high expectations for all children, particularly those from groups that have traditionally failed to achieve their potential. They use proven, evidence-based teaching and learning practices, such as assessment for learning – using data to track, monitor and respond to individual pupil progress, and ensuring that progress informs next steps.

We are focused on assessing pupils' individual learning needs, and tailoring our teaching methods and our curriculum in response.

We have created a teaching and learning policy which identifies our key practices and strategies for securing consistently high standards of teaching. Our focus in consistently on helping teachers to become more effective practitioners, using the most up to date educational research.

9 out of 10 lessons were judged to be "Good " or better (ETI January 2014)

We strive to ensure that: every pupil is taught in a way that meets their needs;

each pupil's progress is regularly checked ;

pupils' additional needs are identified early and addressed appropriately .

Learning Resource Team:

Our Learning Resource Team is made up of our SENCo (Mrs Rafferty), three specialist teachers (Mr McGugan, Mrs Clarke-Jones and Mrs Giffen), three learning mentors (Ms Murphy, Mrs McAree and Mr Carmichael)and a committed group of Teaching Assistants. Together we strive to make our Mission a lived reality for pupils.

"The school supports well those pupils at risk of marginalisation and has effective structures in place to ensure their inclusion and retention in school. The quality and level of skills that all pupils with special and additional needs develop to overcome barriers to learning is very good, reflecting well the effective focus placed on this by the SENCO.

Pupils' needs are identified at an early stage and they benefit from well planned support provided by the Teaching Assistants and the Learning Support Teachers."

Innovation/Inspiration

We believe that a child's ability is not fixed at eleven (a belief echoed across the most successful educational systems in the world). Since 2011 we have been moving towards complete mixed ability class groupings, with no need for a 'P7 test'



The inspection has found clear and compelling evidence (including quantitative data) of how this new arrangement has improved significantly the quality of experiences and standards achieved by **all** pupils.

ETI reported that, based on their evidence, "the more able pupils are definitely not being disadvantaged by the new arrangements while at KS4 the additional support for learning has meant that pupils who require support develop effective personal and social skills and most make very good progress attaining standards at GCSE commensurate with their peers" (ETI January 2014)

Curriculum / Careers

As well as a range of 'traditional' academic subjects, we have introduced a range of BTEC qualifications at levels 2 and 3. In addition, we now offer GCSE Further Maths and A' Level Software Systems Development.

SKILLS

We recognise that our pupils need to develop systematically a range of skills to achieve success in life in the 21st Century. We are currently conducting a review of our curriculum provision at Key Stage 3 in order to build more effectively on the skills pupils develop in our partner schools. We want to avoid unnecessary repetition of mere content. Instead we want our pupils to learn deeply and apply what they have learned in unfamiliar contexts.

In January 2016, pupils from Year 8 and Year 10 took part in the BT Young Scientist Competition in the RDS, Dublin. St Patrick's was named **Best Northern Ireland School**, beating off opposition from 24 other schools. The Year 8 team was highly commended and the Year 10 pupils were awarded 1st place in Northern Ireland in the Social and Behavioural junior group for their project entitled "Power Down to Power Up!"

Spiritual Development and Service to others

In St Patrick's, prayer is a very important part of school life. Each day begins with prayer, either in Form Class or Year Assembly.

Each Friday a Communion Service is held in our Oratory at 8.30am.

The weekly Year Assemblies, led by our own pupils, allow us to publicise the "Good News Stories" about the Year group which are sent by members of staff to the Head of Year; they accentuate excellent behaviour or care for others and celebrate pupils who have exceeded expectations and are named as 'Learning Champions' by subject teachers. All pupils have one period per week dedicated to Personal Development, called Form Period. The purpose is to empower pupils and to help them become more self-aware and to develop a sense of self where they can embrace the many opportunities on offer. Positive relationships are nurtured during this time with peers and Form Teachers.

"At the end of last year, St Patrick's High School in Keady, Northern Ireland, had a lot to celebrate. It is a non-selective school in a place where academic selection is the norm. Three years earlier, only 51 per cent of GCSE pupils were achieving five A*-Cs including English and maths. By 2015 it had become the highest-performing non-selective school in Northern Ireland, with 82 per cent of pupils reaching the milestone (and 93 per cent leaving with five GCSEs).

But how did St Patrick's make this impressive turnaround? It created three core school-improvement groups focused on teaching and learning, motivating and engaging boys, and Assessment for Learning. It built stronger links with its partner primary schools and embarked on ambitious staff-led development schemes, including professional learning groups. A learning resource centre now assists students who are struggling and stretches those who are achieving at the highest level.

But it's not all about the academic side: St Patrick's is prominent in the local community, sending food hampers to those in need at Christmas and organising regular visits to the elderly. As the school's entry to the TES Schools Awards pointed out, the emphasis is on education in its "fullest sense".

In a competitive category, the judges said the "innovative work and move away from banding, the amazing results achieved and rate of acceleration" made St Patrick's stand out."
